- Launch our Church Replanter Residency Program and have several pastors going through this process of preparation to revitalize struggling churches.

## **CELEBRATING 140 YEARS**

## ORIGIN OF THE JACKSONVILLE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Jacksonville Association was formerly the St. Marys River Association. Its earlier history was comprised of churches located in Southeast Georgia and Northeast Florida, in counties adjacent to the St. Marys River. The first session was held with the Hebron Church, Camden County, Georgia, November 21st, 1879, where it was organized. Four churches entered into the organization at this meeting, viz: Hebron and New Providence in Camden County, Ga., Mt. Olive and Mt. Zion in Nassau County, Florida. At the first annual session there were but eight messengers, two from each church. These were G. A. Malette and G. H. Peeples from Hebron, E. A. McWhorter and Thomas J. Simmons from New Providence, G. A. Pendarvis and D. H. Higginbotham from Mt. Olive, and Theodore Davis and Daniel Davis from Mt. Zion. The second annual session was held with the New Providence Church, October 1st - 3rd, 1880. The third annual session was held with Mt. Olive Church, October 1st - 3rd, 1881. Places of meeting, and officers elected for succeeding sessions are given in the Historical Table. Our Association does not have a file of minutes previous to the year 1901. Information found for the years 1879 to 1900 was secured from John B. Stetson University Library, and the State Library at Tallahassee. For twenty-three years our body was called the St. Mary's River Association, but at the twenty- fourth annual session held with the Moniac Church, Charlton County, Georgia, October 24th - 26th, 1902, Dr. W. A. Hobson of Jacksonville made a motion to amend the constitution striking out the words "St. Mary's" and substituting the word "Jacksonville." The motion was unanimously carried, and the St. Mary's Association became the Jacksonville Association. The Association under the new name was composed of nineteen churches with a total enrollment of 976 members. There were only six Sunday Schools in the Association at this time, with a total enrollment of 363. The First Church, Jacksonville led this group with an enrollment of 146. The first annual meeting of the newly constituted Jacksonville Association was held with Bethany Church, Nassau County, October 2nd - 4th, 1903. There were reported only seven ordained ministers in the Association at this time. Officers elected at this session were S. M. Scruggs, Moderator; E. H. Reynolds, Clerk, and Abram E. Ogilvie, Treasurer. S. M. Scruggs served as Moderator for twelve consecutive years, and Abram E. Ogilvie served as Treasurer continuously for forty-five years. Both have entered into rest with their Lord, but the influence of their faithful ministry can never be lost to the Association.

Today, the Jacksonville Baptist Association is composed of over 200 churches and church plants. We continue to grow as we extend the Gospel all across the First Coast of Florida.

As a team of pastors and ministry leaders, the Equip Team remains committed to strengthening churches through coaching, training and resources. In addition to church consultations, leadership coaching and pastor search team training, here are several outcomes we are celebrating from the past year:

There are a growing number of pastors who meet regularly at our **Pastor's Advance** church revitalization group. Pastor Albert Byrd leads this peer group.

Nine emerging worship leaders received the Walter L. Brown Music Scholarship.

We sponsored a **ReFocus Church Leadership** two-day event with over 200 participants.

**Kairos Coaching** cohorts number 12 and 13 were launched and we are now approaching 120 pastors and leaders who have completed this leadership development & disciple-making training.

We hosted several engaging conferences: Dr. Jeff lorg led a well attended, dynamic workshop on **Leading Major Change.** Pastor Dean Inserra offered an insightful presentation on his book, **The Unsaved Christian**.

We continue to offer **micro-loan assistance** to churches who have a financial need to further their ministry.

If you have a passion to equip churches and leaders, we would love to have you engage with this team. It is our privilege to walk alongside other busy pastors and leaders and encourage them towards a faith-filled vision of the future!

## EXPAND TEAM REPORT

This year, our network of churches welcomed a number of new churches into watchcare, many of which were church plants! Thanks to changes at the state and national level of SBC life, we will now be able to provide unprecedented levels of support and encouragement for new church plants, beginning in 2020.

In January, we kicked off the year with a richly diverse Celebration of Church Planting with over 200 in attendance.

We currently have thirteen couples going through the NAMB assessment process to plant new churches in the Jacksonville area.


2020 will see the launch of new churches in Springfield, Arlington, St. Johns County (2), Riverside, the Northside, and the Westside (and possibly other places)!

City Church Bartram launched this morning! It is the first plant of City Church San Marco, which launched (in partnership with the JBA and Southside BC) four years ago this month!

We currently have four Church Planter Peer Learning Groups meeting across the JBA area (Orange Park, Northside, Westside, and Arlington). Additionally, thanks to the generous contributions of JBA churches, we were able to host Kadi Cole in May to provide excellent training on Adjusting Leadership to Fit Your Organization and Developing Female Leaders in Your Church.

## **ENGAGE TEAM REPORT**



This year, we have focused our efforts on the Gospel above all. Our primary effort has been to resource churches to equip believers to transition everyday conversations into gospel conversations. As of the end of September, we have trained nearly 600 people in some form of evangelism and community engagement. This training has been delivered in a variety of contexts, but always with the goal of equipping God's people to infuse the Gospel into every conversation.

To that end, we are especially excited to host our first Evangelism Summit on November 7 & 8. The summit includes an evening of worship followed by a day of evangelism training staffed by some of the world's top evangelism trainers. This is the perfect opportunity to prepare your church to participate in the "Who's Your One?" challenge. While the content of Gospel conversations is crucial, the contexts for those conversations also matter. We want to share the Gospel in word and deed. From our faith-based partnerships to disaster relief efforts, the Engage Team has created opportunities for churches to collaborate while meeting our community's felt needs. A growing number of churches are partnering with their local schools. Many have responded to the invitation to "saturate" Jacksonville with the Gospel by distributing the Jesus Film to their neighbors. Others have mobilized disaster relief teams traveling to the panhandle and Puerto Rico to respond to the needs of those devastated by recent hurricanes. Churches have sent supplies, partnered to meet the needs of hurting churches, and sent Disaster Relief and Send Relief teams to provide assistance in a variety of ways. These and many other opportunities have been made even more meaningful as an increasing number of our people are being trained to share the Gospel in contexts just like these.




## **BUDGET 2020**

## JACKSONVILLE STATEMENT ON GOSPEL UNITY

## Preamble

As evangelical Christians we acknowledge the reality that division and disunity are tools of the Enemy against the proliferation and spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Whether in families, local church bodies, neighboring churches, or even denominational entities, division has unfortunately been far too normative throughout church history.

Race, as commonly defined, refers to the various ethnicities, skin colors, and cultural heritages of human beings. As evangelical Christians, we acknowledge the sinful divides among those of differing races that, at times, have been ignored or worse, excused within the church.

Reconciliation refers to the acknowledgement of human brokenness and the need for restoration to God through Jesus Christ (Colossians 1:20-23). In that he has reconciled humanity to himself, Christians are to be reconciled one to another, as children of God (2 Corinthians 5:18).

Great strides toward reconciliation occurred in the United States throughout the second half of the twentieth century. Yet, many continue to experience great division and painful separation due to ethnicity, cultural heritage, and/or race. While acknowledging much has been done to reconcile over recent decades, it is clear we have far to go.

Racial reconciliation for Christians is not solely, or even primarily, a political issue. Racial reconciliation for Christians is not merely a social justice issue. Racial reconciliation for Christians is not a public relations issue. Racial division is a sin issue. Therefore, racial reconciliation for Christians is a gospel unity issue.

To ignore sin is to affirm sin. Therefore, the pastors and leaders serving together in local churches and denominational entities have deemed it right, timely, and proper to present a clear, concise, biblically-founded, gospel-centered statement on gospel unity and racial reconciliation.

We believe that God has created all humanity in His image, male and female, with diverse skin tones and ethnic histories. As image-bearers we exist for the glory of God knowing that brings us the greatest good. We believe that salvation is found in Jesus Christ alone and that he died so that all may be saved (John 3:16). This offer is for all people. Believing we need clarity on the issues of unity and racial reconciliation among believers, we offer the following affirmations and denials.

## Articles

## Article 1

WE AFFIRM that racial reconciliation is a gospel issue.

WE DENY that racial reconciliation is solely a social issue.

Matthew 15:21-28; Romans 1:16-17; Galatians 2:11-14; Ephesians 1:9-10, 13; 2:1-10, 13, 14-22; 3:3-5

## Article 2

**WE AFFIRM** that the gospel alone offers hope and celebrates what the world fears.

**WE DENY** that anything other than God and the full message of the gospel provide the hope and answers needed for humanity.

Psalm 28:7; 46:2-3; Lamentations 3:18; Matthew 12:21; Romans 8:24-25;

12:12; 1 Corinthians 13:13; Galatians 5:5; Hebrews 11:1, 7; Titus 2:11-14; 1 Peter 1:3, 1 John 3:3

## Article 3

**WE AFFIRM** the biblical teaching of race references the differences between Jewish and non-lewish peoples.

**WE DENY** the definition of race that creates a racial hierarchy based on inferred biological inferiority.

Leviticus 19:34; Acts 8:26-40; Romans 10:12; Ephesians 2:11-3:8; 1 Corinthians 12:13

## Article 4

**WE AFFIRM** that Scripture teaches that Canaan was cursed by Noah due to his son Ham's actions and that Cain was marked by God following the murder of his brother Abel.

**WE DENY** the curse of Canaan, often called the "Curse of Ham" and the mark of Cain, wrongly defined as a change of his skin color, refers to racial superiority or inferiority or has anything to do with differing skin tones of people.

Genesis 4:15; 9:20-25; 10:6

## Article 5

**WE AFFIRM** that gospel-centered racial reconciliation is a pursuit of love for others flowing from Holy Spirit-empowered obedience of those who repent, believe in the cross and resurrection of Jesus by faith, and are justified by faith in Christ.

**WE DENY** that ethnic diversity is synonymous with gospel-centered racial reconciliation. Deuteronomy 10:17-19; Matthew 25; John 13:34; Acts 10:34-35; Galatians 3:28; Ephesians 4:32; James 2:8

## Article 6

**WE AFFIRM** that God has designed marriage to be a covenantal, lifelong union between one man and one woman, regardless of race or ethnicity, for His glory, signifying the covenant love between Christ and His church.

**WE DENY** that marriage between a man and woman from differing racial or ethnic backgrounds to be sinful.

Genesis 2:23-24; Matthew 19:6; 2 Corinthians 6:14; Ephesians 5:22-23; 28-29; 31

## Article 7

**WE AFFIRM** that pastors are uniquely called and positioned to shepherd their people toward gospel-centered racial reconciliation understanding that diversity is actually at the heart of the gospel.

**WE DENY** that racial reconciliation can be forced upon others through human means. John 21:15-17; Ephesians 4:11; 1 Timothy 3:1-7; 1 Peter 5:1-2

## Article 8

**WE AFFIRM** the resolutions approved at Southern Baptist Convention annual meetings repenting of the sins of racism, most notably slave-holding of past generations, and the need for continued work toward gospel-centered racial and ethnic unity.

**WE DENY** that the sins of past generations can be ignored and need not be acknowledged. Nehemiah 9:1-2; Jeremiah 6:16; Daniel 9:16

## Article 9

WE AFFIRM that all human beings are image bearers of God.

**WE DENY** the validity, truthfulness, and right standing of any and all organizations, groups, or individuals claiming racial superiority of any kind.

Genesis 1:26-27; Galatians 3:28; Ephesians 2:15; James 3:9; 1 Peter 2:17; Revelation 7:9

## Article 10

**WE AFFIRM** that unity in our churches must be founded in Christ alone.

**WE DENY** that unity in our churches can be founded in political ideologies or national identity. Psalm 20:7; 133:1; Daniel 2:21; Matthew 6:33; Romans 8:28; 13:1-8; 1 Corinthians 12:27; Ephesians 4:2; Philippians 2:3; 1 Peter 2:13-15; Jude 3; Revelation 7:9-12
